2. Stock Dove Columba oenas

Date of observation: 06th, 13th and 19th June 2021 Notes of the observer: Apparently unpaired male displaying and singing from a row of Peduncolate Oaks and Poplars with, at least, two suitable nest cavities. Seen courting Jackdaw Corvus monedula (06th June) and Wood Pigeon Columba palumbus (19th June), fortuitously perched on the proximities of the

cavities.

Reasons of interest: Summer presence of the Stock

Dove in the central and eastern Po Valley is very rare, with few observations and no confirmed breeding in the last decade. In the province of Modena, only a previous breeding attempt is known, in 1989. Extraspecific courtship seems to be infrequent, however wild hybrids with the Wood Pigeon are known.

3. Sarus Crane Grus antigone

Notes of the observer: A pair of Sarus Cranes continually moved between different mustered crops. The individuals were observed foraging on harvested rice stems.

Reasons of interest: The population of the Sarus Crane is rapidly declining; this is the first known observation of the species for this region in the last 15 years, as well as the first photographic record for the area.



2021. Breeding occurred in this period for the first time in the Empoli and Vinci municipalities. Currently the local population counts for at least 12 individuals, which have been observed while feeding on fruits of *Melia azedarach* and *Catalpa bignonioides*.

Reasons of interest: The Rose-ringed Parakeet is an alien species with increasing populations throughout Europe. Mapping the distribution and keeping occurrence maps updated is necessary to prevent damages to biodiversity. Before this record, the species was known to be present in Tuscany in the Firenze metropolitan area (between Sesto Fiorentino and Lastra a Signa, 25 km far from this study site), in Forte dei Marmi (Lucca, 70 km far from the study site), and in the coastal area between Follonica (Grosseto) and Piombino (Livorno), 90 km far from the study site.
